 For the three forces competing for political authority in France during World War II, music became the site of a cultural battle that reflected the war itself. German occupying authorities promoted German music at the expense of French, while the Vichy administration pursued projects of national renewal through culture. Meanwhile, Resistance networks gradually formed to combat German propaganda while eyeing Vichy's efforts with suspicion. In *The Musical Legacy of Wartime France*, Leslie A. Sprout explores how each of these forces influenced the composition, performance, and reception of five well-known works: the secret Resistance songs of Francis Poulenc and those of Arthur Honegger; Olivier Messiaen's *Quartet for the End of Time*, composed in a German prisoner of war camp; Maurice Duruflé's *Requiem*, one of sixty-five pieces commissioned by Vichy between 1940 and 1944; and Igor Stravinsky's *Danses concertantes*, which was met at its 1945 Paris premiere with protests that prefigured the aesthetic debates of the early Cold War. Sprout examines not only how these pieces were created

and disseminated during and just after the war, but also how and why we still associate these pieces with the stories we tell—in textbooks, program notes, liner notes, historical monographs, and biographies—about music, France, and World War II.

Durante todo el proceso de recopilación de información y redacción me hice la misma pregunta, ¿Existe algo en común entre estos cien hombres?, y hasta ahora no encontré respuesta. Varios de ellos provinieron de familias muy ricas, otros fueron muy pobres; unos tuvieron el respaldo de su familia mientras algunos ni siquiera la llegaron a conocer; muchos pudieron viajar por lejanos países y hubo quienes no salieron de su patria. Tampoco me parece que llegaron a ser grandes hombres por haber pertenecido a la masonería, algunos pertenecieron a esta sociedad hasta su muerte, otros algunos años y Voltaire por ejemplo, pocas semanas. Sin embargo, si coincidieron conciencias tan trascendentes en la masonería es también porque en poco o en mucho quizás, encontraron en esta organización una forma de ser mejores y de alimentar sus ideales de libertad, igualdad y fraternidad. Seguramente se preguntarán ¿y las mujeres? Por qué están excluidas del texto?. No creo que hayan trascendido menos que los varones, pienso por ejemplo en el proceso de independencia de Quito, ¡cuántas mujeres valientes y con ideales firmes existieron!, es tan solo que este texto no pretende recordar la historia y sus actores, tan solo quiere rescatar esta parte de la memoria, los masones, que a

veces parece quererse olvidar. Laure Humbert explores how humanitarian aid in occupied Germany was influenced by French politics of national recovery and Cold War rivalries. She examines the everyday encounters between French officials, members of new international organizations, relief workers, defeated Germans and Displaced Persons, who remained in the territory of the French zone prior to their repatriation or emigration. By rendering relief workers and Displaced Persons visible, she sheds lights on their role in shaping relief practices and addresses the neglected issue of the gendering of rehabilitation. In doing so, Humbert highlights different cultures of rehabilitation, in part rooted in pre-war ideas about 'overcoming' poverty and war-induced injuries and, crucially, she unearths the active and bottom-up nature of the restoration of France's prestige. Not only were relief workers concerned about the image of France circulating in DP camps, but they also drew DP artists into the orbit of French cultural diplomacy in Germany.

The robbery and restitution of Jewish property are two inextricably linked social processes. It is not possible to understand the lawsuits and international agreements on the restoration of Jewish property of the late 1990s without examining what was robbed and by whom. In this volume distinguished historians first outline the mechanisms and scope of the European-wide program of plunder and then assess the effectiveness and historical implications of post-war restitution efforts. Everywhere the solution of legal and material problems was intertwined with changing national myths about the war and conflicting interpretations of justice. Even those countries that

pursued extensive restitution programs using rigorous legal means were unable to compensate or fully comprehend the scale of Jewish loss. Especially in Eastern Europe, it was not until the collapse of communism that the concept of restoring some Jewish property rights even became a viable option. Reparations of Nazi Victims in Postwar Europe traces reparations back to their origins in the final years of the Second World War, when victims of Nazi persecution for the first time articulated demands for indemnification en masse. Simultaneous appearance of claims in New York, London, Paris and Tel Aviv exemplified the birth of a new standard in political morality. Across Europe, the

demand for compensation to individuals who suffered severe harm gained momentum. Despite vast differences in their experiences of mass victimisation, post-war societies developed similar patterns in addressing victims' claims. Regula Ludi chronicles the history of reparations from a comparative and trans-national perspective. This book explores the significance of reparations as a means to provide victims with a language to express their unspeakable suffering in a politically meaningful way.
