The Dutch involvement in North America started after Henry Hudson, sailing under a Dutch flag in 1609, traveled up the river that would later bear his name. The Dutch control of the region was short-lived, but had profound effects on the Hudson Valley region. The Colony Room Club was home to Soho's eclectic art community for generations, famously including Francis Bacon. Everyone left their careers at the roadside before clambering the stairs and plunging into questionable behaviour'. A club member since the gift of membership as an 18th birthday present, Sophie Parkin herself intimately describes the club as 'fish tank whose water needed changing'.
