"In 1857, Captain William Lewis Herndon sacrificed his life trying to save 600 passengers and crew when his ship foundered in a hurricane off the Carolina coast. Memorialized in Gary Kinder's best-selling book *Ship of Gold in the Deep Blue Sea*, Herndon, with this final courageous act, epitomized a lifetime of heroism.
