He returned to Italy to organize the order. Once his community was authorized by the Pope, he withdrew increasingly from external affairs. Francis is known for his love of the Eucharist.[5] In 1223, Francis arranged for the first Christmas live nativity scene.[a][6][7] According to Christian tradition, in 1224 he received the stigmata during the apparition of a Seraphic angel in a religious ecstasy, [8] which would make him the first person in Christian tradition to bear the wounds of Christ's Passion.[9] He died during the evening hours of 3 October 1226, while listening to a reading he had requested of Psalm 142 (141)
