'playing white' for some years, we went one step further and 'jumped the colour line'. By various obscure and not well-documented processes, we changed our 'racial classification' from 'coloured' - as defined by the apartheid policy of the day - to that of 'white' ... She has, in fact, jumped the colour line. Returning to southern Africa in the 1990s, she now openly pursues investigations into her family background. Ulla Dentlinger portrays some of her relatives and their intimate,

painful or straightforward stories as well as her own emotional realisation about her enriching heritage.
