 Kutiyattam 'Zusammenspiel' ist das einzige Sanskrittheater des indischen Subkontinents, das auf eine seit Jahrhunderten unbrochene Tradition zuruckblicken kann. Es zeichnet sich nicht nur durch eine ausserst komplexe Handgestensprache und hochstilisierte Mimik aus, Kutiyattam ist auch die einzige vormoderne Theaterform Indiens, in dem Manner und Frauen als Darsteller gemeinsam auf der Buhne agieren. Die Auffuhrung eines Einzelaktes kann durch den Einschub von Ruckblicken auf bis zu 41 Tage gedehnt werden. Nannyar-Kuttu wird ein erzahlerischer Einschub im 2. Akt des Schauspiels Subhadradhananjayam

genannt, den eine Schauspielerin in mehrtagigem Spiel auffuhrt. "Nannyar" steht hier fur die Schauspielerin, "Kuttu" fur den langen Soloeinschub. Im ersten und zweiten Teil dieses Buches wird der gesamte Theaterkomplex einschliesslich seiner Geschichte bis zu den aktuellsten Entwicklungen vorgestellt. Die nachsten drei Kapitel widmen sich speziell dem Nannyar-Kuttu, vor allem der Verbindung von Text und Performanz sowie dem Repertoire. Hierfur werden auch Manuskripte und Interviews ausgewertet. Mehrere Anhange bieten erstmals eine umfassende Bibliographie zum Thema sowie ausfuhrliche, auf die Bibliographie bezogene Glossare zu Stichworten und den Schauspielen mit ihrer Auffuhrungspraxis.

 This volume of the HISTORY OF INDIAN THEATRE presents most enchanting and

colourful panorama of folk and traditional theatre flourishing in India since time immemorial. Utilising various sources the author meticulously and systematically builds up the theatre history, which spans over several centuries. It is for the first time an elaborate account of dramatic rituals associated with the Bhuta or the Cult of Spirits is given here. This will enable the students of theatre understand and relationship of ritual and dramatic performance in its correct perspective. Various ritualistic theatre forms such as Teyyam are described and discussed. The book also tells us how the technique of ballad singing was dramatized and finally evolved into full-fledged drama in the course of time. The history of narrative forms is traced from the Vedic times to the present. With the emergence of Bhakti cult the spics were dramatized. This gave rise to the Leela Theatre which dedicated itself

to portraying the divine acts of incarnations such as Krishna and Rama. Various forms of Leela Theatre are described in the book. Audiences turn to theatre for entertainment. A class of folk theatre arose in India whose main function was secular entertainment. Swang, Tamasha, Nautanki, Khyal entertained the people with dance, music and song, as well as with humour and pathos, love and war. Their enchanting story is narrated here.

Socially marginal groups in Indian society—Telugu women, for example, or Untouchables from Madhya Pradesh—have recast the Rama story to reflect their own views of the world, while in other hands the epic has become the basis for teachings about spiritual liberation or the demand for political separatism. Historians of religion, scholars of South Asia, folklorists, cultural anthropologists—all will find here refreshing perspectives on this tale.

The monograph explores the linguistic impact of the colonial and postcolonial situations in South Africa on language policy, on literary production and especially on the stylistics of fiction by indigenous South Africans writing in English. A secondary concern is to investigate the present place of English in the multilingual spectrum of South African languages and to see how this worldly English relates to Global English, in the South African context. The introduction presents a socio-linguistic overview of South Africa from pre-historic times until the present, including language planning policies during and after the colonial era and a cursory review of how the difficulties encountered in implementing the Language Plan, provided for by the new South African constitution, impinge on the development of black South African English. Six chapters track the course of English in South Africa since the arrival of the British in 1795, considered from the point of view of the indigenous African population. The study focuses on ways in which indigenous authors 'indigenize' their writing, innovating and subverting stylistic conventions, including those of African orature, in order to bend language and genre towards their own culture and objectives. Each chapter corresponds to a briefly outlined historical period that is largely reflected in linguistic and literary developments. A small number of significant works for each period are discussed, one of which is selected for a case-study at the end of each chapter, where it is subjected to detailed stylistic analysis and appraised for the degree of indigenization or other linguistic or socio-historic influences on style. The methodology adopted is a linguistic approach to stylistics, focusing on indigenization of English, inspired by the work of Chantal Zabus in her book, *The African Palimpsest: Indigenization of Language in the West African Europhone Novel* (2007, (1991)). The conclusion reappraises the original hypothesis - that the specific characteristics of South African literary production, including styles of writing, can be related to the political, social and economic context - in the light of many fresh insights; and discusses the place occupied by English in the cultural struggle of the formerly colonized peoples of South Africa.

Most significantly, for the first time, the book offers some extraordinary insights into the links between the actor's breathing and consciousness. It covers a range of topics: Hatha Yoga breathing techniques, eye training, hand gestures, movement techniques, voice training and rasa acting.
