Scott DeVaux takes a central chapter in the history of jazz—the birth of bebop—and shows how our contemporary ideas of this uniquely American art form flow from that pivotal moment. DeVaux begins with an examination of the Swing Era, focusing particularly on the position of African American musicians. He highlights the role played by tenor saxophonist Coleman Hawkins, a

Throughout, DeVaux places musicians within the context of their professional world, paying close attention to the challenges of making a living as well as of making good music. He shows that bebop was simultaneously an artistic movement, an ideological statement, and a commercial phenomenon. In drawing from the rich oral histories that

a living tradition provides, DeVeaux's book resonates with the narratives of individual lives. While *The Birth of Bebop* is a study in American cultural history and a critical musical inquiry, it is also a fitting homage to bebop and to those who made it possible.
