A New History of Ireland is the largest scholarly project in modern Irish history. After trekking through another temporary home in Jordan, she lands in Palestine, where she finally makes a home, falls in love, and her destiny unfolds under Israeli occupation. Nahr’s subversive humor and moral ambiguity will resonate with fans of *My Sister, The Serial Killer*, and her dark, contemporary struggle places her as the perfect sister to Carmen Maria Machado’s *Her Body and Other Parties*. Written with Susan Abulhawa’s distinctive “richly detailed, beautiful, and resonant” (*Publishers Weekly*) prose, this powerful novel presents a searing, darkly funny, and wholly unique portrait of a Palestinian woman who refuses to be a victim.
