"Art" has always been contested terrain, whether the object in question is a medieval tapestry or Duchamp's Fountain. is that traumatic memories are frequently beyond the sphere of medical, legal, or state intervention. To address these different, often intertwined modes of language, the contributors provide a variety of disciplinary approaches to foster innovative debates and provoke new insights.
