In the third section, the authors examine the phenomenon of epics and spectacles that arose from films like *Gone with the Wind*, *Samson and Delilah*, and *Spartacus* and continues to evolve today in films like *Spider-Man* and *Pearl Harbor*. In this section, Hall and Neale consider advances in visual and sound technology and the effects and costs they introduced to the industry.
