At the end, however, it is realized that Captain Nemo, from *Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea*, has secretly been helping the settlers. A marvelous

adventure story, *The Mysterious Island* is also notable for its modern retelling of the utopian deserted-island myth, with repeated echoes of *Robinson Crusoe* and the *Swiss Family Robinson*.
