For most Spaniards it became an aberration, a criminal and terrorist band whose persistence defied explanation. Others, mainly Basques (but only some Basques) understood ETA as the violent expression of a political conflict that remained the unfinished business of Spain's transition to democracy. Basque-Armenian language parallels are undeniable, statistically significant, and suspiciously absent in the mainstream academia. Their central position in local religious life revises how we think about the social and religious limitations placed on early modern women. By situating the seroras within the social dynamics and devotional life of their communities, The Basque Seroras reconceives of female religious life and the opportunities it could provide. It also shows how these devout laywomen were

instrumental in the process of negotiated reform during the Counter-Reformation. **The Basque Country and Navarre** Cambridge University Press The Basques played a remarkably influential role in the creation and maintenance of Spain's colonial establishment in the Philippines.
