This volume deals with
the inherent relation
between literary genres
and cultural memory.
Indeed, generic
repertoires may be
regarded as bodies of

shared knowledge (a sort of 'encyclopaedia' or 'museum' of stocked culture) and have played and still play an important role in absorbing and activating that memory. The contributors have focused on some specific memory-linked genres that prove especially relevant in remembering and transforming past experiences, i.e. the (post)modern historical novel and various forms of (post)modern autobiographical writing. They deal with such renowned authors as

Carlos Fuentes, Vargas Llosa, Umberto Eco, Antonio Tabucchi, John Barth, Julian Barnes, Michel Butor, Nathalie Sarraute, Alain Robbe-Grillet, Claude Simon, Georges Perec and Marguerite Yourcenar. The volume, thus, constitutes an attractive and representative sample of (post)modern forms of rewriting and problematizing individual and collective pasts. **La vie mode d'emploi** Harvard University Press Jongleur virtuose de mots et de formes, observateur

attentif de son époque, conteur intarissable, Georges Perec (1936-1982) est un écrivain dont la renommée ne cesse de croître auprès d'un public très diversifié, en France et à l'étranger. La discrétion et l'humour de Perec ont pu masquer en un premier temps le véritable enjeu de son oeuvre. Depuis le milieu des années quatre-vingt, on voit cependant se développer une sensibilité accrue à la place que l'Histoire tient dans l'oeuvre de cet auteur, né

en 1936 à Paris, dans une famille d'immigrants d'origine juive polonaise. Cet ouvrage retrace d'une part l'élaboration progressive de la poétique perecquienne qui s'est nourrie des expérimentations littéraires et des échanges intellectuels au sein de l'Oulipo. D'autre part, il confronte ce projet d'écriture à l'analyse de trois textes narratifs, *Un homme qui dort*, *W* ou le souvenir d'enfance et *Un cabinet d'amateur*. *Ecrire est*, selon Perec, un jeu qui se joue à deux, entre

l'écrivain et le lecteur. Une fois qu'il s'est laissé séduire par les énigmes de ces textes, le lecteur doit accepter de suivre Perec à tâtons dans les méandres de son labyrinthe. Ce n'est que lorsqu'il consent à s'associer patiemment au mouvement de l'auteur qu'il comprendra ce autour de quoi tournent ces textes et vers quoi, sans cesse, ils retournent.

 The effort to go beyond given knowledge in different domains – artistic, scientific, political, metaphysical – is a characteristic driving force in modernism and the avant-gardes. Airman, war hero,

immigrant, law student, diplomat, novelist and celebrity spouse, Romain Gary had several lives thrust upon him by the history of the twentieth century, but he also aspired to lead many more. He wrote more than two dozen books and a score of short stories under several different names in two languages, English and French, neither of which was his mother tongue. Gary had a gift for narrative that endeared him to ordinary readers, but won him little respect among critics far

more intellectual than he could ever be. His varied and entertaining writing career tells a different story about the making of modern literary culture from the one we are accustomed to hearing. Born Roman Kacew in Vilna (now Lithuania) in 1914 and raised by only his mother after his father left them, Gary rose to become French Consul General in Los Angeles and the only man ever to win the Goncourt Prize twice. This biography follows the many threads that lead from Gary's

wartime adventures and early literary career to his years in Hollywood and his marriage to the actress Jean Seberg. It illuminates his works in all their incarnations, and culminates in the tale of his most brilliant deception: the fabrication of a complex identity for his most successful nom de plume, Émile Ajar. In his new portrait of Gary, David Bellos brings biographical research together with literary and cultural analysis to make sense of the many lives of Romain Gary - a hero fit

for our times, as well as his own.

 Main description: What sort of society could bind together Jacques Roubaud, Italo Calvino, Marcel Duchamp, and Raymond Queneau-and Daniel Levin Becker, a young American obsessed with language play? Only the Oulipo, the Paris-based experimental collective founded in 1960 and fated to become one of literature's quirkiest movements. An international organization of writers, artists, and

scientists who embrace formal and procedural constraints to achieve literature's possibilities, the Oulipo (the French acronym stands for Oworkshop for potential literature0) is perhaps best known as the cradle of Georges Perec's novel A Void, which does not contain the letter e. Drawn to the Oulipo's mystique, Levin Becker secured a Fulbright grant to study the organization and traveled to Paris. He was eventually offered membership, becoming only the second American

to be admitted to the group. From the perspective of a young initiate, the Oulipians and their projects are at once bizarre and utterly compelling. Levin Becker's love for games, puzzles, and language play is infectious, calling to mind Elif Batuman's delight in Russian literature in *The Possessed*. In recent years, the Oulipo has inspired the creation of numerous other collectives: the OuMuPo (a collective of DJs), the OuMaPo (marionette

players), the OuBaPo (comic strip artists), the OuFlarfPo (poets who generate poetry with the aid of search engines), and a menagerie of other Ou-X-Pos (workshops for potential something). Levin Becker discusses these and other intriguing developments in this history and personal appreciation of an iconic- and iconoclastic-group. Crime fiction is a popular target for literary pastiche in France. From the *nouveau roman* and the Oulipo group to the current *avant-garde*, writers have seized on the genre to exploit it for their own ends, toying with its

traditional plots and characters, and exploring its preoccupations with perception, reason and truth. In the first full-length study of the phenomenon, Simon Kemp's investigation centres on four major writers of the twentieth century, Alain Robbe-Grillet (b. 1922), Michel Butor (b. 1926), Georges Perec (1936-82) and Jean Echenoz (b. 1947). Out of their varied encounters with the genre, from

deconstruction of the classic detective story to homage to the roman noir, Kemp elucidates the complex relationship between the pasticheur and his target, which demands an entirely new assessment of pastiche as a literary form.
