of the most creative designers on the scene today. **Given Time** Basic Books (AZ) Mar'a Lugones, one of the premiere figures in feminist philosophy, has at last collected some of her most famous essays, as well as some lesser-known gems, into her first book, *Pilgrimages/Peregrinajes*. Lugones writes out of multiple and conflicting subjectivities that shape her sense of who she is, resisting the demand for a unified self in light of her necessary ambiguities. *Pilgrimages/Pe regrinajes* explores the possibility of deep coalition with other women of color, based on 'multiple understanding s of

oppressions and resistances'— understanding s whose logic she subjects to philosophical investigation. Israel's Holocaust and the Politics of Nationhood Rizzoli Publications Is giving possible? Is it possible to give without immediately entering into a circle of exchange that turns the gift into a debt to be returned? This question leads Jacques Derrida to make out an irresolvable paradox at

what seems the most fundamental level of the gift's meaning: for the gift to be received as a gift, it must not appear as such, since its mere appearance as gift puts it in the cycle of repayment and debt.
